#### Sermon

Some of you may know the work of documentary filmmaker Louis Theroux. He has produced over 50 documentary films that explore the controversial and complex aspects of the human condition. He shines lights on intriguing beliefs, behaviours, and institutions by getting to know the people at the heart of them. In one of the episodes of his most recent series Forbidden America, he immerses himself in Florida's multimillion-dollar rap scene and follows some of its notorious superstars. Many of those superstars grew up in deprived neighbourhoods and witnessed gun crime, drug abuse and street violence from a young age, or becoming involved themselves. Their experiences are often reflected the lyrics and music videos, and often glorifying, even encouraging, gun violence. One of the rap stars says that this simply reflects the reality of their upbringing. Where if not in the arts can the sometimes-brutal reality of our existence be expressed? Gun crime, drug abuse, street and domestic violence are part of many people's reality, perhaps of yours, too. And in that respect there are many parallels between Florida's 21st century rap scene and the Bible.

Let's go back in time, from Florida in the year 2021 to the Kingdom of Judah in Palestine sometime around 1000-800 BC. The Bible tells us about the great King David, first King of the united monarchy of Israel and Judah. According to the Books of Samuel, David is a young shepherd and harpist who gains fame by slaying the giant Goliath and later ascends the throne.

Biblical literature and archaeological finds are the only sources that attest to David's life, and so historically speaking it is difficult to say who David really was or if he even existed at all. According to the Bible, David was a talented musician and song writer, and many of the Psalms are attributed to him, including Psalm 27 that we have just heard. It is however unlikely that David was the sole composer of these Psalms. They were written over a timespan of 400-500 years and more likely co-authored by people whose identity we don't know, and then attributed to the great King to underpin his authority. But whatever the origin of this biblical song collection, their intention is perhaps more interesting than their authorship. What reality do they reflect? What message are they trying to transmit?

King David's Psalms are religious hymns addressed to God. Thematically, they include the description of suffering, protest, petition for God's help, faith, prayer, and thanksgiving... and they also talk about violence and war; and quite a lot, actually. War and violence are omnipresent in the Bible. Some passages are so violent and upsetting that I wouldn't dare reading them out aloud in church. There are calls to slaughter the enemy, every man, woman and child. There are verses about utterly destroying the enemy and their cities. Violence in the Bible is problematic. At the same time, it reflects the reality of human life on earth. It is, sadly, part of the human experience. The war in the Ukraine, the terror in Afghanistan and ongoing conflicts in many other places worldwide are a reminder of this reality.

War in Europe brings closer to home how fragile peace is. We have been taken it for granted for decades. We have seen other parts of the world shattered by war, but Europe felt relatively safe for a long time. That is no longer the case. We feel vulnerable with a war on our doorsteps and the reality of armed conflict closer to home. It could be us. Thoughts of the conflict spreading further into our towns or cities are crossing our mind. What would I do? Where would I go?

War is a reality, now closer to us than ever. King David wasn't a stranger to warfare and violent conflict, and the words of Psalm 27 resonate with us as we are witnessing the war in Ukraine through our news channels.

Though an army encamp against me,

my heart shall not fear;

though war rise up against me,

yet I will be confident.

Do not give me up to the will of my adversaries,

for false witnesses have risen against me,

and they are breathing out violence.

I believe that I shall see the goodness of the Lord

in the land of the living.

Here, the Psalm expresses the experience of a person on the receiving end of violence, surrounded by an army, struggling with fear, praying for God's protection. Sometimes however, the Bible calls for violence. "Does the Bible justify violence?" is a question that's often asked by scholars. The Bible has inspired pacifism and the civil rights movement. Theories of just or preventive war are rooted in the Bible, and the Bible has even been used to justify genocide and apartheid. The Bible has certainly contributed to violence, precisely because its authority is rooted in God who in essence transcends human discussion and argumentation. It leads us to the question of theodicy, the question of how evil can persist in the world if God is all-knowing, all-powerful and good.

One possible response is that God has given us freewill which limits God's power. Freewill cannot exist without the possibility of evil. We are given the choice between the path of evil and the path of good, because without the possibility of evil, how could we know goodness? This is a huge and complex responsibility, perhaps too much for us humans to bear, and sometimes we utterly fail. We can see it all around us, in the photos that reach us from the war zones of this world, but also in the biblical texts promoting violence and destruction as a reflection of people's experience and the human condition.

Teach us your way, O Lord,

and lead us on a level path,

we pray.

We need your presence, your wisdom and guidance. Be our guiding light, a stream of living water, and never-ending source of love so we may serve your purpose in the face of our adversaries.
