Reading Luke 10:38-42

As Jesus and his disciples were on their way, he came to a village where a woman named Martha opened her home to him. She had a sister called Mary, who sat at the Lord's feet listening to what he said. But Martha was distracted by all the preparations that had to be made. She came to him and asked, "Lord, don't you care that my sister has left me to do the work by myself? Tell her to help me!"

"Martha, Martha," the Lord answered, "you are worried and upset about many things, but few things are needed—or indeed only one. Mary has chosen what is better, and it will not be taken away from her."

Dialogue sermon (Rev Gerry Stanton and Rev Carla Maurer)

Dear parishoners, Dear listeners

When Jesus visited the house of sisters Mary and Martha, Mary sat by Jesus' feet and listened. Martha however was distracted by all the preparations that had to be done. Martha was annoyed by Mary's reaction and asked Jesus to tell her off for not helping.

The story of Mary and Martha, the sisters who reacted to differently to Jesus' coming, is well known and often discussed in Bible groups. Are you more like Mary, contemplating, listening? Or more like Martha, busy preparing things? Are you a bit of both? Do you even have the choice, or do you feel forced into acting in a certain way?

Gerry and I decided to talk about the story of Martha and Mary because we experienced the lockdown as a real-life Mary-Martha test. Suddenly, our churches were closed, the contact with our congregation no longer possible, and we sat there, in our vicarages, wondering what next.

We saw how churches around the world kicked into action, we observed how we kicked into action too, trying new things, sometimes wondering whether we were doing the right thing, wondering what God calls us to do now, at times confused, tired, exhausted for no seeming reason.

So, Gerry, Martha or Mary?

Reverend Carla Maurer and Reverend Gerry Stanton met at Union Church to record a conversation. The following is a summary of their conversation.

Gerry thinks that the answer a Minister should give is Mary, contemplative, praying, receiving Jesus' every word. The reality however is often different. There are many practical things that need to be done, and especially at the beginning of the lockdown, there was a need for management. There are also many things that we think we should be doing, or that other people think we should be doing. Often as Ministers we are between the two, and the coronavirus has highlighted that.

Some churches and Ministers are really busy and have all the zoom and facebook activities going on. Part of us is thinking, we should be doing that as a church, Gerry says, but then he realises that many members of his congregation don't have access to the technology. Both Carla and Gerry had that feeling when the lockdown started that they had to do something. At the beginning there were practical things to do, like communicating the lockdown, consider what to do with members of staff, make sure congregation members receive calls and support from friends and family.

The whole routine of life was thrown out for everyone. Gerry says that he likes to think of himself as someone who doesn't particularly like routine, but then he realised how important a certain routine is.

Perhaps kicking into action has something to do with finding a new routine, instead of taking the days as they are in all their emptiness and not knowing which is perhaps very unusual and difficult to go with. Martha's way of doing things and creating work for yourself is perhaps the easier way, Carla suggests. Modern life is geared up around that, Gerry thinks, and for better or for worse, churches reflect that.

Gerry says that every time he hears this story preached, the conclusion is generally: be more like Mary, don't be like Martha. However, Martha is preparing the food, making sure Jesus still eats and drinks. If all of us would be sitting around contemplating nothing would ever get done.

Gerry says that he definitely had more time during the lockdown to pray more, but there still are things to be done. Now that we are told that we can reopen churches, it isn't actually as straight forward as we think. We feel there is a tendency to be wanting to be busy again. But is it the right thing? If we reopen badly or at the wrong time, we are putting people at risk. It's important to find out what people want and what the congregations feel comfortable with. On the one hand people want to come back, want to worship in their church and see their friends again, but there is a risk attached to it. It's about finding the right balance. Both churches, Union Church and the Swiss Church, might be a few weeks or even longer before they feel they can safely reopen.

Carla remembers that a few weeks ago when dentists could open again, she wondered why only a certain percentage of them open again. After all, didn't they have 3 months to think about it? But now that churches are in this position, she perfectly understands. You know the opening is coming, but you don't know how it will feel. When we went into the lockdown, after the initial busy weeks, there came that time when we had to embrace those empty days in a different way. Carla decided quite early not to go into overdrive, do a few things, do them well, and try not to get too impressed by all the things other churches do. Social media can put that pressure on us. We could do midday prayers every day, zoom meetings and so much more. But it's actually a very precious time to look after our own spiritual needs and development as Ministers, too. Do the things you can do well for your congregation and also appreciate this precious time.

Gerry says that as Ministers we are very privileged generally. We are not worried about paying our mortgages, not worried about being furloughed, and most of us will have jobs to go back to. As Ministers, if we are not close to God, we are not serving our congregations properly. This time in lockdown has given us that chance to grow closer to God, to be more Mary than usual! Contemplation is there to prepare us for action. Something needs to come out of contemplation. Carla feels it's more difficult to come out of the lockdown than going in. Of course, it was a huge shake up for many people's life, but it was very clear: stay home, don't go out. But now it's difficult to know what's going to happen, if a second wave is going to come, how close we can be to people, who we should see, finding out what we are ready for. Also, how long is it going to last? Will there be another lockdown? Both Gerry and Carla feel more anxious coming out of it. The thought of going to a pub is somehow daunting. It's also not very nice to think that if we do go out, we are going to avoid one another. This avoiding people in the streets or giving people a funny look if they don't wear a face mask changed the climate between us. This is what we are facing now.

Gerry's words to our two congregations: "God saw all this coming, not caused it, but saw all this coming, and is with us throughout and will be with us on the other side. There are great opportunities for us to serve our neighbour and love our neighbour and reopen to that. There are great opportunities as well for us when we are not in the buildings. There is always hope, and we are in great place, Union Church and Swiss Church to be able to help people."
