#### Dear Reader,

Welcome to this edition of the Swiss Church News. It is my great privilege to have been part of the Swiss Church London (SCL) community since November.

In my capacity covering Reverend Carla's maternity leave allows me to discover a different part of the West End. I now found myself switching lanes in my daily commuting route from Tottenham Court Road to Gower Street. Riding past University College, a helpful reminder for me to reflect on the role of the Church in society. Whether we truly represent the ministry of Christ and bring the heart and soul of the Gospel to the people around us?

Switching legions to the Swiss Church allows me to explore London through a different lens. I had the opportunity of meeting ministers of many other denominations in the proximity. Adding further identity confusion to my own ministerial vocation, an anglicised Episcoplian Chinese presbyter and now with a slight Zwingli or Calvinistic twist!

In ethnic ministries overseas, where a specific language of worship could easily enclaved the openness and mission of any church. The SCL has proven quite the opposite by welcoming people from all walks of life into its premises. It truly reflects the famous Wesleyan quote - 'the world is my parish'.

I cannot say much more about Switzerland, especially since most of our readers have stronger ties with Switzerland than myself, but what I can accompany with readers to explore further is the extent of being an overseas person in London and how well the Swiss community here on Endell Street has embraced their identity as Swiss diasporas. In these few short months, I got to meet a diaspora community with its rich heritage and culture, fully immersed into the daily lives of the ordinary people in the hearts of Covent Garden. From hosting secular events in Arts or corporate team building, overnight it transforms into a venue serving breakfast to the community. I trust that people would at least take time to Google the English translation for 'je ne mettrai pas dehors celui qui vient à moi' and 'Gott segne dich und behüte dich'. Such hospitable welcome allows more people to step inside of a church, who would have gone to an alternative venue. It is also humbling to have read appreciation letters from children and grandchildren of past congregation members who are recently deceased, their fond memories of the church and who feel greatly indebted for the support of the SCL throughout the years.

While I am trying my best to catch up on the most basic sentences required in Swiss German or French, I did not feel for one minute that I was not worthy to shepherd the Swiss Community here on Endell Street. A big thank you to you all.

The year 2022 was eventful and the BBC managed to sum up most of the main events in a 74 second video. I looked back and would have never imagined myself remaining in London at the end of the year. Yet the same old Woody Allen quote- 'If you want to make God laugh, tell him your plans!'

We have our goodbyes to the old and welcome the

new, various contributors that have highlighted the challenges in 2023, we look forward to yet another eventful calendar year.

A big difference to the rhythm of the building is that we have far fewer weekly regular hires, mainly because the clients' needs have changed, and also because we have been cautious with weekly hires as they can end up entwining with the identity of the organisation.

Though the sound of fewer hires may seem concerning (and a bit scary), it's also worth knowing that most of our weekly hires pre-pandemic were very highly discounted, many hardly engaged with the community or organisation, and most did not align with or further SCL's mission. As the world is fully finding it's new "normal", I hope this extra space on the hall's calendar will enable us to take on more lucrative hires, be the venue for more events that further our word of mouth reputation, and, more importantly, enables us to support activities that express the mission and identity of The Swiss Church in London (have you seen the SCL arts programme yet?!).

If I'm completely honest, seeing space on the calendar can make me feel a little bit anxious, but space is need if one wants to grow – and I'm sure as you read through the rest of the Swiss Church News, you'll agree that it feels like SCL is growing into an exciting new chapter. support and friendship; to all members of the Congregation for bringing life to the Church, and for your trust; to the volunteers of BoS for your hard and invaluable work to the community; and to the Arts Committee for making the Church a place of encounter and wonder.

#### Art Programme Propels into 2023

What a busy and successful second half of 2022 it turned out to be for the Art Programme at the Swiss Church. Our Art Committee, led by Co-Chairs Mary Branson and Julie Hoyle, along with our great team of volunteers and Art Coordinators, were involved in a number of exhibitions and events that formed part of 2022-2023 Art Programme. They were designed to promote a variety of creative arts practices under the umbrella of the



beautiful architecture of the church. In November 2022, we opened the doors to Cora Sehgal Cuthbert's culminating Artist in Residence exhibition. Exploring love and loss, *I Left Love Here Somewhere* was a mixed media installation based upon the artist's relationship with her Nan. Made up of text, photography, sculpture and print, the installation explored the ways in which the themes of family, immigration, spirituality, grief, isolation, mental health, care, love and loss intertwine. In a moving exhibition, Cora asked us the question, 'When all seems to be lost, can love still be found?'

Fabienne's exhibition looks at fabric as a metaphor for community. This explores the idea that community, like fabric, is made by the joining of disparate elements into a whole that offers shelter and belonging.

Hess is getting to know these communities well and has invited the members of the Mothers' Group to her studio in Hackney to take a look at her artwork and to collaborate with her on the content of her silk hanging designs for the upcoming exhibition.

Ministry in Cyprus, A short reflection - By Rev Harry Ching

Cyprus often appears in the same sentence with Switzerland in many John Le Carré novels! I had a wonderful time serving a diverse parish for 2 years, based in Famagusta. Like Switzerland, Cyprus has a rich history and mixed linguistic heritage, situated at the cultural crossroad in the Eastern Mediterranean, a stepping stone of many great empires throughout the centuries. The island was under British rule between 1878-1960, which shared many similarities with my native Hong Kong. Furthermore, the island has a great biblical significance where St Paul and Barnabas had set foot in Acts 13:4. The island was first mentioned in Numbers 24. Larazus came to Cyprus and died there the second time.

Today the Cyprus Question remains as one of the long outstanding unresolved conflicts in the world. From a ministry perspective, my primary focus was to an African student majority chaplaincy parish, which students aspired of a European dream. Many young Africans were ill informed about the Cyprus situation and were lured to the Turkish Cypriot administrated part of the Island. They were seen as illegitimate under of the authority of the internationally recognised Republic of Cyprus, unable to complete the pilgrimage from Salamis to Paphos.

The parish of Ammochostos is shared with two other expatriate congregations of mainly British retirees which meet in an Orthodox chapel in a local cemetery in Deryneia and a shared building with the Scandinavian church converted from a disused bank. Congregation members on either side of the age group 35-60 (A mirror contrast to my Dubai parish in terms of demographics). In spite of the political challenges, parish life was harmonious, young and old worship under one roof in the chapel of Little St. George on Salamis Road in a joint service monthly, 6km away from the ruins of Ancient Salamis City and the Tomb of St Barnabas.

Friday Night football with the men's team against counterparts from with other denominations and student societies were unforgettable, while Bible studies and prayer remain an integral part of weekly parish life. Music team was strong and services were well attended, the small chapel of St. George that was once con turn into art workshop during the initial Turkish intervention in 1974.

The challenges for the parish continued to this date, yet I am reminded of the Chinese word for "crisis", when there is crisis there is always hope!

### Congratulations Mrs Vivienne Williams -by Norman Williams

#### Dear reader,

I am writing to you to inform you that my mother was 100 years old on 26th January 2023. Her name is Mrs Vivienne Williams (formerly Iller). The family has been much to thank the Swiss Church in London for especially in the inter wars period. But how and why you may ask? The family history on mother's side can be traced back well into the 1700's in Switzerland. However, my grandmother and grandfather came to London in the inter wars period in their late teenage years independently and met initially through their work in the kitchens of a major London Hotel. Grandfather, Gotleib Iller came from Appenzell and Grandmother, Emma Gaux from La Chaux – a village in upper Lausanne area. Both found their

way into the Swiss church in London and were married. They were not well off and struggled and the Swiss Church assisted them in so many ways including accommodation finding. They lived in the Kensington and Ladbrook Grove areas of London but eventually moved out to Vivian Avenue in Wembley Middlesex. There were six children, Emily, Albert, Rosa and George (Twins ), Helene, and Vivienne. I believe there was also another child who died. Life was tough.

During the 2nd world war, Albert became a major in the intelligence Corp of the army and he even met a cousin from the United States who was also a major, in the US forces, two Major Illers! Emily and Rosa worked in domestic jobs and Vivienne joined the ATS as a secretary to colonels etc. Mum had many stories to tell. Unfortunately, she is suffering from Dementia now and resides in a care home in Watford and is receiving excellent care. In herself she is well and strong not taking much medication at all. If fact very remarkable but at this grand age she sleeps a lot.

Rosa (Gathard) used to keep in touch with the Swiss Church until she passed away aged 95... a prolific letter writer and received the church magazine 'Swiss Messenger' regularly. Mum, being the youngest was often looked after by her two eldest sisters with Helene only a few



years her senior. Helene lived to 102 and I believe you were informed of her 100th birthday a couple of years ago. She lived in Canada but has since passed. Mum is the last of the family still alive. My recollections of the Swiss Church date back 65 or more years as through Aunty Rosa my mum and dad took my younger brother and I for several years running, as young children, in the 1950's to the Annual Christmas Children's' party somewhere in a hall in Holborn or south Kensington where we were given a tea, sandwiches, cake, a Swiss flag, badges and a goodie bag with a calendar of a Swiss scene as well as Swiss sweets and bread biscuits. I remember we saw films portraying life in Switzerland, Swiss railways etc. and played games with many other Swiss children – happy times as we were not well off. I vaguely remember some other events.

One thing I found out recently, was that the real family name was Iller von Spreicher.... I suspect they dropped the von Spreicher bit. I also found Grandather's Christening certificate!

I would like to express my thanks to the Swiss Church in London for what you did for the Illers' and wish you and your current work every success.

Not only did they land a National Lottery's Community Fund grant of £3,200, but their Big Give Christmas Campaign reached the target of £6000, which was doubled by the campaign. Breakfast with tea, coffee and a kind smile for the homeless people in the area is secure. Well done!
