
As a Venue Manager, you expect the unexpected every day, but I've never had to deal with a pigeon in the hall before! It was during that transition period, just a day



New Breakfast on the Steps Arts Club

Since April 2024, we have been hosting weekly art workshops for people affected by homelessness and poverty. These take place every Tuesday from 9am – I I am, after the Breakfast on the Steps in our on-site artist studio and in the main hall.

Each week, a core group of 10 workshop attendees develop 2D works on paper and canvas, alongside digital works such as film, photography and digital collage.

The workshops are a new collaboration between the Swiss Church Art Programme and the longstanding Breakfast on the Steps programme. Artist-led and centred around the participants' drive to explore materials, processes and ideas, the sessions have fostered conversations, artistic exchanges and collaborations. Our workshop partners with the London Graphic Centre. Based a few streets away in Covent Garden, they generously provide art materials for our sessions.

In the past few months our son Benjamin was given a range of children's books. He is still too young to appreciate them as books, and prefers to tear the pages with his little hands, or tries to fit a whole book into his little mouth. But while one can be too young for a good children's book, if it really is good, one cannot be too old.

I've known about 'The Boy, the Mole, the Fox and the Horse' for a while now. A bestseller by London-based artist (sculptor and illustrator) Charlie Mackesy, last week it ended up in my hands for the first time. I started reading and I didn't want to stop. There aren't many words in the book. It's all cartoons. But surprisingly, this doesn't make it less emotionally perceptive or spiritually deep.

One page struck me in particular. Fox, Boy and Mole sit next to each other on the top of a hill looking at the night sky. They say to each other: 'So much beauty we need to look after.'

Having only just begun my role at the Swiss Church; having only just moved into the vicarage; having only just started to get to know the congregation, the groups, the volunteers, the team, the homeless, the Swiss clubs, the history of the church and the memories attached to it, I have this same sentiment right now. There is, here, 'so much beauty we need to look after'. I took this phrase as a motto for my work. Ministering to the people at the Swiss Church and looking after the church is looking after beauty. There is so much of it.

Whether we do see the beauty in each other and in the tasks we've been given is, of course, a matter of perception. It doesn't always come naturally to us to see the beauty. I think there is a reason for this. Seeing beauty is a spiritual task. An atheist before he became a Christian, Charlie Mackesy's own spiritual journey was shaped by this insight. "Jesus quietly introduced me to a journey into finding people really beautiful, which is how my art really began", he said.

In the rush of 'getting things done', there is a danger that we switch into a problem-solving mode which makes us see only that: problems.

Solving problems is an important thing, but looking after beauty is the more fundamental task. It is the reason that problems are worth solving in the first place.

Not only is looking after beauty a great motto for a minister who ministers to a church, but for everyone who attends to anything – be it our partners, children, neighbours or neighbourhoods, elderly parents or grandparents, friends, gardens, or any worthwhile project. And I do think that it's a particularly good motto for a church.

Churches are not here for themselves. They are not meant to revolve around themselves. They are called to spread the Good News that there is a God who loves us: a God who thinks that we are worth looking after. Knowing about this love makes us want to become part of the task of looking after each other and the world we live in, so that beauty can go on flourishing.

It is my prayer that God gives us eyes and hearts with which we can see the beauty we are called to be looking after together.

May God bless you. You are beautiful.

Manuel Zimmermann Grey joined the Swiss Church in London in September 2024, and feels as though he landed in the only job which really fits his biography:

Having grown up in the Bernese Oberland (a region held especially dearly by the British) he studied theology at the University of Bern and also at Durham University, UK. There, he met the person who later became his wife, the theologian Carmody Grey. After his ordination in the Reformed Church in Bern in 2023, they moved to Carmody's family home in Sussex, UK, where their son Benjamin was born. A few months later they moved to London, to the Vicarage of the Swiss Church - a place in which they hope to contribute to a flourishing community life. Manuel's passion for

church and people was formed in his early years and never went away, whether it was as a youth leader at his local Methodist church, in summer camps, or when offering pastoral care as a Chaplain in the Swiss Army. He believes that churches, at their best, seek to go the heart of things: to the heart of the Christian message, to the heart of human needs, to the heart of social and ecological crises. He loves how multifaceted his role, is while constantly challenging him to do something very basic: to love God and to love people.


